FUNDRAISING MATCHING CHALLENGE

To help us maintain momentum and revitalize our overall Capital Campaign to raise money for the construction of the new library building, one donor is challenging the community to raise \$25,000, which she will match. An anonymous donation of \$10,000 has brought our total up to \$20,105 as of January 26. We're 80% of the way there!

Stories from the Library - Help Us Build

In addition to fundraising, this donor encourages everyone to tell their stories about the library. Here is hers:

"I grew up in Carthage and recall vividly the role that the library played in my childhood. My siblings and I stopped by often on our way home from school or on a slow Saturday when the pool wasn't open. When Mother couldn't find one of us, she phoned the library early in her search to see if we were there - hidden in the stacks with a book.

The library taught me so much - to value the experiences of others, to see reading as a ticket to adventure, to take the time to start early on one of Miss Allison's research papers, and to return our books on time. I am so happy to support the new library project. I do so in gratitude for my own experience and hope that others will join the effort to create an important new home for an institution that has served many well for years."

Another former resident, Nancy Dixon Benz, shared this story on Facebook:

"The library was my second home growing up and I participated in SOAR for a long time. I loved being able to ride my bike downtown, pop in and find a new book, and escape to far-off places. I remember when the library moved into the Marine bank square location and I was bummed because I loved the old location so much, but I grew to love the move and became obsessed with the Teen Vault I love that my hometown is progressing and growing. Our library is such an important part of that."

1 pm: **Teens:** Teen advisory will meet. We will have some snacks, and have teens answer some questions, then we will make some library decorations.


2 pm: **book club.** Going along with the theme we will be reading <u>Love and Luck</u> by Jenna Evans This is for HS students and adults.
